## **Executive Summary**

The 2025 Arkansas Labor Market and Economic Report is produced by the Labor Market Information unit within the office of Workforce Policy and Innovation to provide relevant information about the economy and workforce in Arkansas and the 10 Workforce Development Areas. The primary focus of this report includes the years 2020 to 2024, with some information covering shorter periods due to accessibility of data. Projection information for industry and occupational trends covers the years 2024 to 2026.

Arkansas grew in population in 2024 by 20,622 from 2023, and added a total of 76,812 new residents from 2020 to 2024. Of Arkansas's 10 Local Workforce Development Areas (LWDAs), Northwest Arkansas saw the largest increase in population, adding 15,761 in 2024. The Eastern, Southeast, and Southwest Arkansas LWDAs saw decreasing populations in 2024.

Between 2023 and 2024 the state's labor force increased by 31,335, and employment increased by 27,373. Labor force and employment varied across the LWDAs. The state's unemployment rate ended at 3.5 percent in 2024, a decrease of 2.7% since 2020. The unemployment remained relatively steady in 2025, ending the month of July at 3.7 percent. The unemployment rate fluctuated across all LWDAs in 2025 and through July 2025.

Short-term employment projections for 2024 to 2026 showed an increase in the Arkansas job market with a gain of 32,743 jobs, equivalent to a 2.23 percent growth in employment. Goods-Producing industries are estimated to see a net gain of 5,708 jobs, while the Services-Providing industries are forecast to increase employment by 26,108. Arkansas' self-employed ranks are estimated to experience a net gain of 927, an increase of 0.92 percent.

Jobs requiring a high school diploma or equivalent are estimated to add more jobs than any other education level with 10,888 jobs between 2024 and 2026. Occupations requiring a bachelor's degree are expected to grow by 9,083.

Arkansas' per capita personal income increased over the 2020-2024 period to \$58,700; however, the state's per capita

personal income in 2024 remained below the United States' per capita personal income of \$77,719.

More than a million Arkansas workers earned at least \$12 or more an hour in 2024, with the mean annual wage for all employer sizes estimated at \$53,074. Of the six states surrounding Arkansas, only Mississippi had a lower overall average hourly and average annual wage for all occupations. Of the surrounding states, Texas had the highest average annual wage.

#### COVID-19

Some of the data in this economic report reflects the impact of COVID-19 while other data sets may not yet reflect the impact. This is especially true when comparing any data from 2020 with data from 2024. It is unknown what the full impact of COVID-19 will be on the data.



## **State of Arkansas**



The state of Arkansas' population grew to 3,088,354 in 2024, increasing 20,622 from 2023 to 2024 and increasing 76,812 from 2020 to 2024. The state of Arkansas consists of 10 Workforce Development Areas (LWDAs), six Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs), and 75 counties. Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, Oklahoma, Tennessee, and Texas border the state.



## Employment/Labor Force/Unemployment




The labor force increased by 31,335 between 2023 and 2024, and employment increased by 27,373 over the same period. Unemployment increased by 3,962 from 2023 to 2024, but has seen a decrease of 33,865 since 2020. The state's unemployment rate increased by 0.2 percent from 2023 to 2024. Over the 2020-2024 period, the unemployment rate declined 2.7 percent to 3.5 percent for 2024. The state's unemployment rate was 3.7 percent in July 2025.



#### **Monthly Unemployment Rate, 2025**










#### Arkansas Labor Force and Number of Employed, January 2008 - December 2024

## Median Household/Per Capita Personal Income




Arkansas' median household income was \$58,700 in 2024 which increased by \$3,268 from 2023 to 2024 but is below the national median household income of \$77,719 for 2024. Arkansas' per capita personal income in 2024 was \$59,663, an increase of \$5,316 from 2023. Over the 2020-2024 period, the per capita personal income increased by \$12,554. The state's per capita personal income is below the United States per capita personal income of \$72,425.



#### **Median Household Income**





In 2024, whites made up 71.7 percent of the labor force while the total of all minority groups made up 28.3 percent of the labor force. The unemployment rate for all races, including Hispanics, was 3.5 percent. The unemployment rate for all minority groups combined was 4.8 percent. Hispanics of all races made up 9.1 percent of the labor force, with an unemployment rate of 3.1 percent.

### Education




All eight education categories are projected to see positive net growth between 2024 and 2026. Occupations requiring no formal education are projected to gain 7,274 jobs during the projection period. Jobs requiring a high school diploma or equivalent are expected to gain 10,888 jobs during the projection period and had the highest educational attainment in 2023 at 34.4 percent. Occupations requiring a bachelor's degree are expected to grow by 9,083 jobs and 15.9 percent of the population 25 years and over had a bachelor's degree in 2023. Growth in occupations requiring a master's degree or doctoral or professional degree is expected to be 1,388 and 904 jobs respectively. Educational attainment of the state's population aged 25 years and over shows that 88.6 percent have earned at least a high school diploma or equivalent, up 0.4 percent from 2022.


## Wages



Material Moving Workers was estimated to have the most employees across the state with 73,180 employed in 2024 with an average wage of \$36,687. Food and Beverage Serving Workers was the second largest occupation with 59,590 employed, earning an average wage of \$27,927.

**Dermatologists** topped the Occupations Paying the Most list with an annual salary of \$390,732. **Physicians, Pathologists**, with an average annual salary of \$250,093, ranked second on the Occupations Paying the Most list.









## Industry



Restaurants and Other Eating Places is projected to be the top growing industry in Arkansas, gaining 3,807 new jobs between 2024 and 2026, increasing its overall workforce in the state to 98,622. Veneer, Plywood, and Engineered Wood Product Manufacturing could see a 33.57 percent rise in jobs, becoming the fastest growing industry in the state. Truck Transportation is estimated to see a difficult outlook between 2024 and 2026, losing an estimated 1,476 jobs, or 4.60 percent of the workforce, decreasing employment to 30,617. Water Transportation is slated to be the fastest declining industry, cutting 23.08 percent of its already small workforce. Education and Health Services is predicted to be the top growing supersector, adding an estimated 10,108 jobs during the projection period, an increase of 3.13 percent.

## **Occupations**



**Fast Food and Counter Workers** is predicted to be the top growing occupation in the state, adding 1,643 new jobs between 2024 and 2026, bringing its employment to a level of 40,836. Roustabouts, Oil and Gas is slated to increase its workforce by 12.39 percent, becoming the fastest growing occupation in the state. Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers is estimated to be the top declining occupation, losing 561 jobs statewide. Coil Winders, Tapers, and Finishers is slated to be the fastest declining occupation, driving down the employment 15.72 percent to 461. Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations is predicted to be the top growing major group, adding 4,095 new jobs, increasing from 109,931 in 2024 to 114,026 in 2026.



## Covered Employment and Earnings



According to the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages Report, Arkansas' covered employment increased by 1.3 percent from 2023 to 2024. This translates to 16,521 jobs gained. Of all the major North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) industry supersector groups, just under half lost jobs during the reference period. Education and Health **Services** gained the most at 6,355 jobs. Construction had the fastest growth, increasing 5.6 percent.

Overall, average weekly earnings in 2024 for the state was \$1,153. The average weekly earnings range from a low of \$444 in Leisure and Hospitality to a high of \$1,676 in Professional and Business Services.




### Population Pyramids for Central Arkansas






The LWDA saw an increase in the labor force of 9,147 to 269,411 from 2023 to 2024, and the labor force increased by 18,033 over the 2020 to 2024 period. Employment increased by 8,352 between 2023 and 2024, and increased by 24,803 over the five-year period. The LWDA has seen an fluctuation in unemployment over the same time periods. From 2023 to 2024, unemployment increased by 795, but from 2020 to 2024, unemployment decreased by 6,770. The LWDA's unemployment rate dropped by 3.0 percent over the five-year period. In 2025, the unemployment rate fluctuated, settling at 3.9 percent in July 2025.





## Local Workforce Development Area Industry



Ambulatory Healthcare Services is slated to add 513 new jobs between 2024 and 2026, becoming the top growing industry in Central Arkansas, moving employment to 9,541. Educational Support Services is projected to raise employment levels by 43.14 percent, becoming the fastest growing industry, moving employment to 73. On the negative side of the job market, Religious Organizations is predicted to cut 355 jobs, becoming the top declining industry, while Grantmaking and Giving Services could see a 34.62 percent reduction, becoming the fastest declining industry. The Education and Health **Services** supersector leads the area, with 1,673 new jobs, moving employment to 42,014.

Sawing Machine Setters, Operators, and Tenders, Wood is anticipated to be the fastest growing occupation, raising employment levels 15.56 percent to 52. On the negative side of the labor market, Clergy could be the top declining occupation during the 2024-2026 projection period, with a loss of 98 jobs, a 5.91 percent drop. Telecommunications Equipment Installers and Repairers, Except Line Installers, is slated to lose 12 percent of its workforce during the same period, becoming the fastest declining occupation. **Transportation and Material Moving Occupations** is projected to gain 870 jobs from first quarter 2024 to first quarter 2026, becoming the top growing major group in Central Arkansas.






### Population Pyramids for City of Little Rock








The labor force increased in the LWDA by 5,077 from 2023 to 2024, and saw an increase of 7,087 between 2020 and 2024. Employment increased by 4.563 from 2023 to 2024, and increased by 10,737 from 2020 to 2024. Unemployment and the unemployment rate increased between 2023 to 2024, with unemployment increasing by 511 and the unemployment rate increasing by 0.3 percent to 3.5 percent in 2024. The unemployment rate fluctuated from 2020 to 2024, but ultimately settled at 3.5 percent in 2024, 4.1 percent lower than 2020. The area unemployment rate fluctuated from January 2025 through July 2025, settling to 4.3 percent in July 2025.









Insurance Carriers is predicted to be the top growing industry, increasing employment by 879 jobs, to a total employment of 15,703. Wood Product Manufacturing is slated to be the fastest growing industry, expected to grow by 366.27 percent between 2024 and 2026. On the negative side of the economy, Social Advocacy Organizations is forecast to be the top and fastest declining industry in the City of Little Rock WDA, cutting an estimated 470 jobs, or 24.42 percent of its workforce. **Manufacturing** is projected to be the top growing supersector, increasing its workforce by 1,211 jobs, a gain of 17.03 percent.





Home Health and Personal Care Aides leads the City of Little Rock WDA in numeric growth, adding 199 jobs, a 7.36 percent gain, between 2024 and 2026, moving employment to 2,902. Coating, Painting, and Spraying Machine Setters, Operators, and Tenders could increase by 41.75 percent to a level of 146, becoming the fastest growing occupation in the area. On the negative side of the local economy, Industrial Truck and Tractor Operators is slated to be the top declining occupation in the area, losing 69 jobs, or 4.63 percent of its workforce, while Print Binding and Finishing Workers is slated to cut 21.15 percent of its workforce, becoming the fastest declining occupation in the City of Little Rock WDA. **Production Occupations** is anticipated to be the top growing major group, raising employment by 744 new jobs between 2024 and 2026 to a level of 8,129.




#### **Population Pyramids for Eastern Arkansas**






The labor force in the Eastern Arkansas LWDA increased by 570 to 42,987 in 2024 from 2023, but has decreased by 2,747 from 2020 to 2024. Employment increased from 2023 to 2024, gaining 505 workers to 40,988. Unemployment saw a slight increase from 2023 to 2024, having 65 more unemployed, bringing the unemployment rate from 4.6 percent to 4.7 percent. Since the beginning of 2025, the unemployment rate fluctuated from 5.6 percent in January, ending July 2025 at 6.0 percent.



#### **Monthly Unemployment Rate, 2025**









### **Eastern Arkansas Number of Employees by Hourly Wage Rate**



Warehousing and Storage is projected to be the top and fastest growing industry, increasing employment by 162 jobs to an employment level of 381, a 73.97 percent increase. On the negative side of the job market, Merchant Wholesalers, Nondurable Goods is predicted to lose 41 jobs, becoming the top declining industry, while Machinery Manufacturing is projected to lose 23.38 percent of its workforce between 2024 and 2026. Trade, Transportation, and Utilities is estimated to be the top growing supersector in the Eastern Arkansas WDA, gaining 147 new jobs between first quarter 2024 and first quarter 2026.





Home Health and Personal Care Aides is predicted to be the top growing occupation in the Eastern Arkansas WDA between 2024 and 2026, adding 58 jobs, increasing its workforce to 918 jobs. Conveyor Operators and Tenders is estimated to be the fastest growing occupation, increasing employment by 15.63 percent, to a level of 37. On the negative side of the labor market, Cashiers could see a drop of 43 jobs, or 3.40 percent of its workforce, while Chemical Equipment Operators and Tenders is expected to lose 12.77 percent of its workforce, becoming the fastest declining occupation. **Transportation and Material Moving Occupations** is forecast to be the top growing major group for the 2024-2026 projection period, with 129 new jobs, moving employment to 4,524.






#### Population Pyramids for North Central Arkansas











Food Services and Drinking Places is predicted to be the top growing industry in North Central Arkansas, gaining 655 new jobs between 2024 and 2026. Significant growth is expected for Grantmaking and Giving Services, becoming the fastest growing industry in the area with an estimated increase of 182.82 percent growth. On the negative side of the labor market, Truck Transportation is expected to experience a loss of 137 jobs, moving employment from 1,537 in 2024 to 1,400 in 2026. Publishing Industries could see a 20.69 percent reduction in jobs between 2024 and 2026. **Leisure and Hospitality** is estimated to be the top growing supersector, adding 657 jobs to the labor force, moving employment to 7,485.

Fast Food and Counter Workers is projected to be the top growing occupation in North Central Arkansas, adding 294 new jobs, increasing employment to 2,036. Bartenders is slated to be the fastest growing occupation, increasing by 16.13 percent, for a total employment of 72. On the negative side of the labor market, Heavy and Tractor Trailer Truck Drivers is predicted to lose 91 jobs, or 4.73 percent of its workforce, to become the top declining occupation. Cabinetmakers and Bench Carpenters is forecast to cut 30.95 percent of its local workforce by March 2026. **Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations** leads all major groups in job growth, estimated to increase its workforce by 61 new jobs, a gain of 9.16 percent between first quarter 2024 and first quarter 2026.




#### **Population Pyramids for Northeast Arkansas**







# Local Workforce Development Area Industry



Food Services and Drinking Places is predicted to be the top growing industry, adding 416 jobs between 2024 and 2026, moving employment to 8,970. Grantmaking and Giving Services is set to increase its workforce by 81.10 percent, becoming the fastest growing industry in Northeast Arkansas, moving employment to 230. On the negative side of the labor market, Transportation Equipment Manufacturing is projected to lose the most jobs, cutting 254 jobs from its workforce, dropping its employment levels to 3,076. Motion Picture and Sound Recording Industries could see a drop of 28 percent, becoming the fastest declining industry in the area. **Education and Health Services** is slated to rise by 1,270 employees, to become the top growing supersector, moving its employment levels to 31,789.

# Local Workforce Development Area Occupations



Home Health and Personal Care Aides is projected to be the top growing occupation in Northeast Arkansas between 2024 and 2026, adding 166 jobs, increasing its workforce to 1,719 jobs. Fundraisers is expected to be the fastest growing occupation, increasing the workforce by 72.97 percent. On the reverse side of the economy, Miscellaneous Assemblers and Fabricators could see a reduction of 113 jobs, or 4.23 percent of its workforce, becoming the top declining occupation in the area, while Paper Goods Machine Setters, Operators, and Tenders is slated to be the fastest declining occupation, cutting 11.63 percent from its workforce between 2024 and 2026. **Healthcare Practitioners and Technical Occupations** is anticipated to be the top growing major group in Northeast Arkansas, adding 510 jobs to the local economy between first quarter 2024 and first quarter 2025, an increase of 5.63 percent.






#### Population Pyramids for Northwest Arkansas






The Northwest Arkansas LWDA labor force and employment increased from 2023 to 2024, with the labor force gaining 6,150 to 362,870 and employment increasing by 4,838 to 352,497. Unemployment increased by 1,312 to 10,373 in 2023, but has seen an decrease of 5,221 since 2020. The unemployment rate rose by 0.4 percent from 2023 to 2024 to 2.9 percent. The area's unemployment rate fluctuated from 2020, but ultimately settled at 2.9 in 2024. The unemployment rate ended July 2025 at 3.6 percent.



#### **Monthly Unemployment Rate, 2025**





Workers was estimated to have the most employees in Northwest Arkansas with 16,970 employed in 2024 with an average wage of \$36,213. Business Operations Specialists was the second largest

occupation with 16,790



employed, earning an average wage of \$84,610. **Healthcare Diagnosing or Treating Practitioners**, with an estimated employment of 11,380, had the highest average wage of the 10 largest occupations, earning \$111,623 annually.

**Dermatologists** topped the Occupations Paying the Most list with an annual salary of \$461,502. **Radiologists**, with an average annual salary of \$275,136, ranked second on the Occupations Paying the Most list.

The entry wage estimate for employers of all sizes was \$29,519 for 2024. The median wage estimate for employers with 250-499 employees was \$44,422, while wages for experienced workers averaged \$71,472 for employers in all size categories.









Food Services and Drinking Places is slated to add 1,768 jobs between 2024 and 2026, becoming the top growing industry in the Northwest Arkansas WDA, moving employment to 29,684. Support Activities for Mining is projected to increase its workforce by 41.18 percent, becoming the fastest growing industry. On the negative side of the economy, Truck Transportation could see a loss of 712 jobs between 2024 and 2026, becoming the top declining industry in the area. Grantmaking and Giving Services is forecast to be the fastest declining industry in Northwest Arkansas, cutting 26.29 percent of its workforce. **Education** and Health Services leads all supersectors in Northwest Arkansas in numeric change, with 3,871 new jobs, a 5.51 percent gain, moving employment from 70,287 in 2024 to 74,158 in 2026.



## Occupations

Fast Food and Counter Workers is slated to be the top growing occupation in Northwest Arkansas between 2024 and 2026, increasing its workforce by 655 jobs to 10,714. Environmental Engineers is projected to be the fastest growing occupation, increasing employment by 22.45 percent to 60 jobs. On the negative side of the local economy, Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers could see a loss of 387 jobs between 2024 and 2026, becoming the top declining occupation, while Fundraising Managers could be the fastest declining occupation, estimated to experience a 17.16 percent reduction in its local workforce. Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations is predicted to be the top growing major group, adding 1,803 new jobs during the projection period to a total employment of 31,294.






#### Population Pyramids for Southeast Arkansas






Southeast Arkansas saw a decrease in the labor force of 2,815 to 72,562 from 2023 to 2024, and employment decreased by 3,020 to 69,204 for the same time period. Both the labor force and employment have decreased since 2020 by 7,389 and 5,148 respectively. Unemployment increased by 205 to 3,358 from 2023 to 2024 and the unemployment rate increased to 4.6 percent in 2024. After starting at 5.4 percent in January 2025, the unemployment rate fluctuated, ultimately settling to 5.8 percent in July 2025.





Other Production Occupations was the second largest occupation with 3,780 employed, earning an average wage of \$43,116. Healthcare Diagnosing or Treating Practitioners, with an estimated employment of 2,110, had the highest average wage of the 10 largest occupations, earning \$97,678 annually.

**Physicians, All Other** topped the Occupations Paying the Most list with an annual salary of \$311,938. **Chief Executives**, with an average annual salary of \$139,376, ranked second on the Occupations Paying the Most list.





## Local Workforce Development Area Industry



Food Manufacturing is projected to be the top growing industry in Southeast Arkansas, increasing its workforce by 242 new jobs, a 6.46 percent gain. Private Households is predicted to be the fastest growing industry, raising its employment levels by 29.28 percent between 2024 and 2026. On the negative side of the local economy, Paper Manufacturing could be the top declining industry with a loss of 282 employees, or 12.21 percent of its workforce. Wholesale Electronic Markets and Agents and Brokers is slated to be the fastest declining industry, cutting its workforce by 58 percent. **Construction** is anticipated to be the top growing supersector, adding 88 jobs between 2024 and 2026, a 4.06 percent rise in employment and one of only three supersectors to experience growth.

Maids and Housekeeping Cleaners is projected to lead Southeast Arkansas in numeric change, growing by 20 jobs, reaching an employment level of 435. Refuse and Recyclable Material Collectors could see a 13.68 percent increase in staffing, moving from 95 jobs in 2024 to 108 in 2026. On the reverse side of the labor market, Farmers, Ranchers, and Other Agriculture Managers is anticipated to be the top declining occupation, losing 142 jobs, or 4.84 percent of its workforce. Fundraising Managers could see a 30.43 percent reduction in its local workforce by first quarter of 2026. **Healthcare Practitioners and Technical Occupations** is estimated to be one of only two growing major groups in the area during the 2024-2026 projection period, with 18 new jobs, moving employment to 3,957.




#### Population Pyramids for Southwest Arkansas




### Employment/Labor Force/Unemployment

The Southwest Arkansas LWDA labor force decreased from 2023 to 2024 by 1,257 to 86,068, while employment decreased by 1,447 to 82,490. Over the five-year period from 2020 to 2024, the area has seen a decrease of 5,072 in the labor force and decrease of 2,694 in employment. Unemployment increased by 190 from 2023 to 2024, but decreased by 2,378 over the five-year period. The unemployment rate rose by 0.3 percent from 2023 to 2024 to 4.2 percent. After various fluctuations in the unemployment rate during 2025, the rate settled at 5.2 percent in July 2025.

was estimated to have the most employees in Southwest Arkansas with 5,220 employed in 2024 with an average wage of \$36,305. Other Production Occupations was the second largest occupation with 4,450 employed, earning an average wage of \$49,418. Other Installation, Maintenance,

**and Repair Occupations** had the highest average wage of the 10 largest occupations at \$57,579 annually.

**Physicians, All Other** topped the Occupations Paying the Most list with an annual salary of \$311,222. **Family Medicine Physicians**, with an average annual salary of \$231,959, ranked second on the Occupations Paying the Most list.

The entry wage estimate for employers of all sizes was \$27,796 for 2024. The median wage estimate for employers with 250-499 employees was \$43,467, while wages for experienced workers averaged \$59,364 for employers in all size categories.

Of the 74,420 estimated employees in the area with hourly wage data, 6,259 made less than \$12 an hour while 19,307 made more than \$27 an hour. Employees making between \$17 and \$21.99 totaled 17,042.



## Local Workforce Development Area Industry



Wood Product Manufacturing is estimated to be the top growing industry in Southwest Arkansas, adding 349 jobs, for an employment level of 3,031. Crop Production could raise employment levels by 19.67 percent, moving from 183 jobs in 2024 to 219 jobs in 2026. On the negative side of the labor market, Machinery Manufacturing is expected to lose its entire local workforce, losing 277 jobs, becoming the top and fastest declining industry. **Manufacturing** is estimated to be the top growing supersector, despite its mixed local outlook, with a projected net gain of 153 new jobs between 2024 and 2026, a 0.82 percent rise in employment to a level of 18,826.





Laborers and Freight, Stock, and Material Movers, Hand is projected to be the top growing occupation in Southwest Arkansas between 2024 and 2026, adding 72 jobs, increasing its workforce to 2,285 jobs. Roustabouts, Oil and Gas could be the fastest growing occupation, gaining 14.49 percent, moving from 138 jobs in 2024 to 158 jobs in 2026. On the negative side of the labor market, Farmers, Ranchers, and Other Agricultural Managers could see a decline of 92 jobs, or 2.66 percent of its local workforce, becoming the top declining occupation. Insurance Claims and Policy Processing Clerks could see a 32.56 percent reduction in its local workforce, becoming the fastest declining occupation. **Transportation and Material Moving Occupations** is forecast to be the top growing major group for the 2024-2026 projection period, with 122 new jobs, a 1.23 percent gain, moving employment above the 10,000 mark.




#### Population Pyramids for West Central Arkansas






In 2024, the labor force and employment increased in the West Central Arkansas LWDA. The labor force increased by 5,091 to a total of 134,894, while employment increased 4,869 to a total of 129,672. The labor force increased by 4,409 from 2020 to 2024 and employment increased by 7,716. Unemployment increased from 2023 to 2024 by 222 to 5,222. The unemployment rate stayed at 3.9 percent. The unemployment rate fluctuated through 2025, but ended at 4.9 percent in July.



#### **Monthly Unemployment Rate, 2025**



## Local Workforce Development Area Wages



Material Moving Workers was estimated to have the most employees in West Central Arkansas with 7,160 employed in 2024 with an average wage of \$36,667. Retail Sales Workers was the second largest occupation with 6,730 employed, earning an average wage of \$29,779. Healthcare Diagnosing or Treating Practitioners, with an estimated employment of 3,930, had the highest average wage of the 10 largest occupations, earning \$100,079 annually.

Physicians, All Other topped the Occupations Paying the Most list with an annual salary of \$259,073. General Internal Medicine Physicians, with an average annual salary of \$209,163, ranked second on the Occupations Paying the Most list.





## Local Workforce Development Area Industry



Ambulatory Health Care Services is predicted to be the top growing industry, adding 344 new jobs, increasing employment levels to 6,388. Civic and Social Organizations is slated to be the fastest growing industry in West Central Arkansas, raising employment by 17.82 percent. On the negative side of the labor market, Transportation Equipment Manufacturing is projected to be the top declining industry, cutting 197 jobs from the workforce, while Leather and Allied Product Manufacturing could see a significant loss of jobs, cutting 65.06 percent of its workforce between first quarter 2024 and first quarter 2026. **Education and Health Services** is projected to be the top growing supersector, experiencing a net gain of 597 jobs between 2024 and 2026, a 2.10 percent rise in employment.

Fast Food and Counter Workers is estimated to be the top growing occupation, with a gain of 125 jobs, moving employment to 4,044. Career/Technical Education Teachers, Postsecondary is predicted to be the fastest growing occupation in the West Central Arkansas WDA, with a 14.95 percent increase. On the reverse side of the labor market, Cashiers is slated to be the top declining occupation, losing 62 jobs, dropping employment to 1,351. Animal Control Workers is anticipated to be the fastest declining occupation, losing an estimated 10.81 percent of its workforce. **Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations** is projected to be the top growing major group for the 2024-2026 projection period, with 321 new jobs, moving employment to 11,672.






### Population Pyramids for Western Arkansas






The Western Arkansas LWDA labor force increased 112,410 to 112,410 and employment increased by 2,036 to 108,454 from 2023 to 2024. Over the 2020-2024 period, the labor force increased by 1,316 while employment increased by 3,873. Unemployment and the unemployment rate both fluctuated from 2020 to 2024. 







# Local Workforce Development Area Industry



Food Manufacturing leads the Western Arkansas WDA region in numeric growth, adding an anticipated 341 new jobs, and moving employment levels to 9,895. Mining (except Oil and Gas) is slated to be the fastest growing industry, increasing its workforce by 30.67 percent. On the negative side of the labor market, Truck Transportation could see a reduction of 234 jobs, 6.60 percent of its workforce, between first quarter 2024 and first quarter 2026. Grantmaking and Giving Services is predicted to be the fastest declining industry, declining by 47.22 percent. **Education and Health Services** is forecast to be the top growing supersector, adding 1,128 jobs between 2024 and 2026, a 4.46 percent rise in employment.

# Local Workforce Development Area Occupations



Home Health and Personal Care Aides is projected to be the top growing occupation in Western Arkansas between 2024 and 2026, adding 136 jobs, increasing its workforce to 2,164 jobs. Electrical Power-Line Installers and Repairers is predicted to be the fastest growing occupation, gaining 16.39 percent, moving from 122 jobs in 2024 to 142 jobs in 2026. On the negative side of the labor market, Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers is forecast to lose 127 jobs, becoming the top declining occupation, while Print Binding and Finishing Workers is slated to cut 15 percent of its workforce, becoming the fastest declining occupation. **Healthcare Practitioners and Technical Occupations** is anticipated to be the top growing major group, increasing its workforce by 350 jobs, a gain of 4.54 percent between 2024 and 2026.


